1. Introduction

This is HRAPF's 35th monthly report on violence and other forms of human rights violations on the basis of sexual orientation and gender identity/expression since the Anti-Homosexuality Act, Cap 117 (AHA) came into force on 30th May 2023. The report discusses cases in which known or suspected LGBTQ+ persons were targeted for violence and violations purely on the basis of their SOGIE as reported to HRAPF in the month of April 2026. This report builds on the reports produced earlier for every month since the AHA came into force and therefore adds on to the data available about the enforcement of the AHA 2023 from 30th May 2023 to date. The month of April 2026 marks exactly 2 years since the Constitutional Court nullified some provisions of the AHA 2023, and is just 1 month shy of 3 years since the AHA came into force.

2. Methodology

This report provides an overview of cases of violence and human rights violations on the basis of SOGIE that were reported to the HRAPF legal aid network in April 2026. Quantitative data for this report was obtained from a review of case files for data on the number of cases handled and the number of cases in which acts of violence or other human rights violations were identified. The data was then subjected to a qualitative analysis to ascertain the circumstances under which the incidents occurred, in order to ensure that only cases in which such acts were perpetrated purely or primarily on the basis of real or presumed SOGIE are included in the report. All data reported has been independently verified to ensure its accuracy.

The data presented in this report covers only cases reported through the HRAPF legal aid network. The report therefore presents a fair picture of the situation for LGBTIQ+ persons across the country as reported to HRAPF's countrywide network of community paralegals, regional legal aid centres, specialised community legal aid desks and the main legal aid clinic, although it may not be representative of all LGBTIQ+ persons' lived realities during the month, as not all cases were reported to HRAPF.

3. Nature and number of cases reported

HRAPF handled a total of 63 cases in April 2026, an increase in number from the 51 cases handled in March 2026. Out of these, 13 cases involved actions that directly targeted people for negative treatment on the basis of their SOGIE, representing 20.6% of all the cases handled during the month and representing a slight decrease from 15 cases of SOGIE-related violations in March 2026. There were 4 cases of discrimination involving 4 victims. The victims of these violations were 20 persons, an increase in number from 15 people affected by SOGIE-based violence and human rights violations in March 2026. One case involved 8 victims, who were subjected to violence in a refugee settlement.

Out of the 13 cases in which individuals were targeted for detrimental treatment on the basis of their real or presumed SOGIE, 5 involved actual violence and threats of violence, 4 involved evictions for sexuality related reasons and 4 cases involved other forms of violence/discrimination on the basis of real or presumed SOGIE. There were no SOGIE- related arrests during the month.

3.1. Cases of violence and threats of violence

5 cases involving violence and threats of violence were reported to the HRAPF legal aid network in April 2026, affecting 12 individuals. This figure remained constant with the number of cases reported in March 2026, in which 5 cases of violence were reported, affecting 5 persons.

a) Cases of actual violence

There were 4 cases registered in April 2026, with 2 cases from Kampala and 1 case each from Kotido and Isingiro. These incidents affected a total of 11 individuals.

b) Cases of threatened violence

There was one case registered in April 2026, reported from Kotido district and affecting 1 individual.

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3.2. Evictions

There were 4 cases in which individuals were evicted from their residences on the basis of their real or presumed sexuality, affecting 4 individuals. One case each was reported from the districts of Kampala, Mbale, Mbarara and Wakiso. In 3 cases, the evictions were by family, while in 1 case, the client was evicted by the landlord. The number of evictions reduced in April as compared to 5 cases of eviction that were received in March 2026.

3.3. Other forms of discrimination

In April 2026, 4 cases were reported to the HRAPF legal aid network in which individuals were subjected to other forms of discrimination on the basis of their real or presumed SOGIE. These were:

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4. Comparison with March 2026

There was an increase in the number of cases involving LGBTIQ+ persons reported across HRAPF's legal aid network, with 63 cases handled in April as compared to the 51 cases were handled in March 2026. The number of cases in which individuals were targeted for violence and other violations on the basis of their SOGIE slightly decreased from 15 cases affecting 15 individuals in March, representing 29.4% of all cases reported in March 2026, to 13 cases affecting 20 people (and representing 20.6% of all cases handled) in April 2026.

There were no cases of arbitrary arrests of persons on sexuality-related charges in April, as compared to 4 cases affecting 4 individuals in March 2026; and cases of violence and threats of violence remained constant with 5 cases affecting 5 individuals in March 2026 and 5 cases affecting 12 individuals in April 2026. Eviction cases reduced from 5 cases affecting 5 individuals in March to 4 cases affecting 4 individuals in April 2026.

5. Comparison with April 2025

In April 2025, HRAPF handled a total of 56 cases, 7 cases less than those handled in April 2026. Out of the 56 cases handled in April 2025, 17 cases involved actions that directly targeted people for negative treatment on the basis of their SOGIE, which is 4 cases more than the 13 handled in April 2026. The number of victims affected by these violations in April 2025 were 22, as compared to 20 in April 2026.

Out of the 17 cases in which LGBTIQ people were specifically targeted for negative treatment during the month of April 2025, 8 were cases of eviction compared to 5 in April 2026, 6 cases involved actual physical violence and threats of violence being committed against the victims compared to 4 in April 2026, and 3 cases involved arrests for sexuality related reasons, while no arrests were registered in April 2026.

Overall, the number cases handled and the cases involving violations fluctuated slightly between the two months, with more cases handled in April 2026 but fewer cases involving actions that directly targeted people for negative treatment on the basis of their SOGIE. In both months, the Anti-Homosexuality Act Cap 117 was already in force.

6. Comparison with April 2023 (the Pre-AHA period)

In April 2023, a total of 59 cases were handled involving LGBTIQ persons, of which 36 cases involved actions that directly targeted persons on the basis of their real or presumed SOGIE (61.1% of all cases handled). The actions in these cases affected a total of 67 people and included 20 cases of real or threatened violence, 10 eviction cases and 6 arrests on sexuality related charges. It is important to note that, during the month of April 2023, the AHB 2023 had been enacted by Parliament and was awaiting presidential assent.

7. The implementation of the AHA 2023 from 30th May 2023 to 30th April 2026

As the implementation of the AHA marks 35 months, a total of 2,354 cases involving LGBTIQ persons have been handled across the HRAPF legal aid network, of which 1,012 cases (42.9%) involved actions that specifically targeted LGBTIQ people because of their sexuality, gender identity and sex development affecting a total of 1,359 individuals. The breakdown of all the cases involving SOGIE-motivated violence and violations so far is as follows:

8. Conclusion

As of 30th April, 2026, Uganda marks 35 months since the AHA came into force, and two full years since the Constitutional Court of Uganda nullified sections 3(2)(c), 9, 11(2)(d) and 14 of the AHA 2023. It is interesting to note that, for the first time since the AHA came into force, there were no documented arrests of individuals on sexuality-related charges. Other months in which particularly low figures of arrests were recorded were August 2024, July 2025 and December 2025, in each of which only 1 arrest was recorded. There was however a marked increase in reports of other violations against clients based on their real or presumed SOGIE, and more individuals faced eviction perpetrated by family members.

APPENDIX: Cases of arrests still pending before police stations and courts across the country at the end of March 2026

Currently, HRAPF is providing legal representation to a total of 6 individuals in 5 cases that are still pending before various courts across the country. In the 5 cases, 6 individuals are answering various charges, including homosexuality, promotion of homosexuality, and aggravated homosexuality in various courts of law. Of the 6 persons whose cases are pending before the courts, 4 are still on remand in the various prisons around the country while 2 were released on bail.
